**Sandra**: What is your favourite medium to work in and why?

**Joan**: My favourite medium is acrylic paint. It is so versatile and fun to work with. I like to layer my art pieces and the quick drying time of acrylic paint really helps in the process.

**Sandra**: How does the fact that you're an engineer influence your art?

**Joan**: I see a lot of squares and rectangles in my art. As a structural engineer, I have designed several buildings over my 17 year career and I know this background is

part of who I am and how I paint. I just recently stepped back in my career to find a work-life balance with my young family. I am using art to heal me as well. Change is good.

**Sandra:**Where do you get the inspiration for all of your great pieces?
